In the first instance, we wish to clean out, in its lowest and filthiest corners, the Augean stables of despotism; to free the people from administrative persecution which throws them guiltless into prison, and there without compassion chastises them, and allows them to suffer with hunger and thirst, and then leads them as insurgents to the gallows, or sends them to the Polar regions to work in the mines.
