HAUBAKI ENGINEERS. The Hauraki Engineers mustered in full strength last night at the Grahamstown Drill Hall for the monthly periodical inspection by Major Murray, as Officer Commanding the District. The corps mustered, of all ranks, upwards of 100 strong, under command of Captain J. S. Small, Lieutenant W. J. Barlow, and Second-Licutenant George Denby. The Major Commanding was received with a general salute, in capital time and precision. After inspecting the ranks, Major Murray called on Licuts. Barlow and Denby to respectively put the men through certain prescribed evolutions; every Sergeant was also called upon to every Sergeant was also called upon to prove his capacity for wearing the engineer chevrons. The Major, in addressing the corps, said: "Capt. Small, officers, and members of the Hauraki Engineers, I am much pleased with your appearance on this your first general uniform parade in your new regulation helmets and uniforms; also, with the efficiency displayed by your sergeants, each of whom displays an intimate acquaintance with the duties an intimate acquaintance with the duties of their position and rank. Nor must I forget to add my testimony to the marked improvement of the band in military music, which I attribute to the ability of their leader, Mr O'Sullivan, and to the assiduous attendance of the bandsmen at the weekly practices. I shall have much pleasure in forwarding a favourable report of the Hauraki Engineers to Major Withers." Major Murray also testified to the unvarying support afforded him by the officers of the Engineers on all occasions when demanded neers on all occasions when demanded, and he considered it right to inform the men that their officers enjoyed his fullest confidence and esteem. His Worship the Mayor, who with other civilians was present to witness the parade, stated that he felt the greatest pleasure in being present on the occasion at the invitation of their officers, in common with othersthe citizens of the Thames. He felt it was incumbent on the public to encourage and foster by every means in their power the efficiency of the volunteers. From what he had witnessed that night he felt convinced that the Hauraki Engineers if called to the front, which they might be any day, would render a good account of themselves. They were fortunate in the possession of experienced officers, and smart and intelligent non-commissioned officers, and in Major Murray, they had the advantage of a commanding officer who had the individual interest of the men, and the welfare of volunteering a heart. Though not one of themselves he had had the honour in bygone days of wearing a similar uniform, and he could assure them he would always do his utmost to advance the success and proficiency of their corps. In consequence of the inclemency of the weather, a march out, which was intended by Captain Small, was deferred until another occasion The men were dismissed to their homes at 9 p.m.

The following is an account of the manuer in which the natives were removed from Livingstone's farm a few days ago :-- " The Volunteers and settlers on arriving at the farm found two Maoris with the calm unconcern as to consequences which is only found in most besotted faraties, working very melancholy, and taking no notice whatever of those assembled near them. A guard of several settlers was then placed over the reserve natives, and after searching them and finding they were not armed they were taken prisoners. The question then arose what is to be done with them? Some were for letting them go, others for horsewhipping them, and others taking them to Hawera, but no decision was arrived at. During this time rumours were circulating that natives in great force were assembling on the other side of the Waingongoro. It was ultimately decided to take some of the ringleaders prisoners and cart the remainder over to the other side of the bridge. The cavalry were sent in front in skirmishing order, and it was evidently | 696 the opinion that they expected some retaliation from the natives, but as other natives appeared when near the bridge, Captain Wilson made his appearance in command of some cavalry, and in a very peremptory manner ordered the prisoners (30th June) at 7 p.m. sharp.

T. L. MURRAY, to be delivered over to his charge immediately. At first the settlers decidedly refused, but, after some consultation, they ultimately handed them over under protest. Commissioner Williams rode to Hawera to consult Mojor Brown on the matter, and they came to the determination that, under the circumstances, it would be much better to allow them to go, as, by keeping them prisoners, no good could be obtained, considering that Beamish and family were then on the plains. It was thought that by detaining the natives prisoners their lives might be endangered, so they were allowed to depart; but they still persist in saying that they will return to-morrow.'

A correspondent telegraphing from Hawera axs:-"I have heard, on the best authouty, that Te Whiti said there will be not loodshed, that if any army assembled found Parihaka the women will receive them and cry 'Welcome, wel-come!' To Whiti says that for years he has tried for justice, and has got nothing. This is the excuse he makes for his ploughing operations. He asserts that the confiscation is illegal; that he is the spirit from heaven sent to see justice done, and that the Maoris will have all confiscated | 7.30 o'clock. and other lands back again. He says they] have but little powder, as their store, containing a considerable amount of powder, was burnt down some time since; that they shall still continue to plough land throughout the whole district. Heed not the pakeha, says Te Whiti to special messengers, sent to Parihaka for instructions, 'My decision has gone forth. Go on with your ploughing.' Such are Te Whiti's latest instructions."

The following remarks were made by Rewi at Puniu the other day : - " Mr Searancke discovered the tree (their tribes) isolated in the lone wilderness. Sir Donald McLean came and felled the tree, leaving the log. Major Mair came and found the log at Te Kuiti. and put a small wedge in; then he got the point of a big wedge in and split the log asunder. Thus it was that the log (the tribe) was brought from its isolation up to the




