RATING ON THE UNIMPROVED VALUES.

On many occasions we have written on the question of rating on the unimproved values of land, and urged the adoption of the system in the Borough. A telegram from Wellington in another column calls attention to the subject, for in that most conservative of cities the adoption of the system has been carried at a poll of the ratepayers by a very large majority. It is only a matter of time when the system will be universal, and the time will be determined by the more general knowledge of the subjet, and the breaking down of prejudice. Inthe Wellington papers many letters with both sides of the question, but evidently the balance of public opinon has leaned towards the reformers. The words of the late Sir John Mc-Kenzie were recently quoted when the ystem were adopted was at one time discussed in Parliament. Said the old land reformer: "We have the old stock argument trotted out with regard to the vacant sections in the city of Wellington. Who own the vacant sections? I do not think the poor people own them; but I venture to say that some of those sections are held by speculators, until such time as the industrious colonists in the city shall make them valuable by improving their own sections. Then, up to the taxation, simply because he fails to improve; but his meighbour, who

time the speculator sells, he escapes makes improvements, and expends money and finds employment for the people in building houses, et cetera has to pay on those alongside him who owns the vacant blocks, has to pay nothing."
