We have much pleasure in welcoming to the Thames the advent of a scheme of technical instruction such as is likely to result from the recent visit of Mr George, the Government Technical expert. Considerable surprise and disappointment will however be felt by many at the attitude assumed by Mr George with reference to the introduction of technical work into our Thames High School. Mr Braid will wield the ming, shorthand, and com arithmetic into the school syllabus to send in particulars at once On the recommendation of the master (Mr Adams) the actual introduction of the subjects referred to was postponed pending the visit of Mr George to the Thames, and on Tuesday last the Board interviewed that gentleman with reference to his opinions on the proposal. As we have said, considerable disappointment will be felt when it is learned that Mr George

has spoken most strongly against the introduction of book-keeping, shorthand, or commercial arithmetic, and that unfortunately he has not suggested any subjects to the Board to be taken in lieu thereof. In short, the result of the interview seems to have simply been to dissuade the Board from taking any further direct action in the matter of technical in struction, and the school is to be allowed to drift along in the same old groove which has served for the last twenty years. We donfess that we had expected a more practical result from this interview, and the Board might likewise have been led to evpect that an expert of Mr George's reputation would not have demolished its proposals without sound reasons, and with out offering a better substitute.
