AMERICA AND CANADA.

SOME IMPORTANT POINTS.

The American newspapers have received Mr Bryce with the very warmest expressions of goodwill, and if the journalism of the States was a reliable guide to the intentions of Congress, as well as a reflection of public opinion, there would be every prospect of an early settlement of all questions outstanding between the great North American neighbours. Although the newspapers at Home have been very silent on the subject, those in New York and Washington declare very positively that Mr Bryce was sent across the Atlantic with definite instructions to engineer an "entente." It is part of his mission, we are told, to put a peaceable end to "all the fifteen questions that mutually worry' Canada and the United States. "Harper's Weekly' says that the British Ambassador is "practically in agreement with Secretary Root, and this means, if it means anything, that the British Foreign Office and our own State Department are in agreement.
