THE LABOUR SHORTAGE.

as follows:---I beg to put before you the following explanation of the requirements of the Defence Department, and the arrangements which have been authorised for meeting, as far as possible,

the labour shortage. On account of the war, it is considered essential to maintain the territorial training, and especially so for lads of 18 and 19 years of age, so that upon attaining the balloting age of 20, they may proceed to the Expeditionary Force Camps with : sufficient knowledge of discipline and military training to enable them to benefit to the highest degree by the training given there. It is only fair to those liable for service at the front that they should receive the maximum amount of training that can be given them. To abandon the territorial camps even for a year would be a very retregrade step and would possibly endanger the future of the territorial force.

In order to meet the wishes of entployers of labour so far as it is possible to do so, the most specific instructions are being issued to the local Defence authorities throughout the Auckland District. These instructions are based on orders received from Headquarters, N.Z.
