It will be a surprise to most people to learn that the Kingdom of Belgium has existed only for about ninety years. In 1830 Count Mercy Argentau was Grand Chamberlain to King William I. of Netherlands. His dominions included Holland and the States which afterwards were formed into the Kingdom of Belgium. These States formerly had been an Austrian province. They were annexed by Napoleon to France, and on his downfall they were placed under the rule of the Dutch King, For fifteen years William I. endeavoured vainly to secure the assimilation of two different nationalities—the Protestant Dutch and the Catholic Belgians. curred in 1830 to secure independ- mouth, England, Prussia, and Russia the Prince Leopold of Saxe-Coburg being chosen as ruler. Strange to say, when modern Belgium was formed, it was Prussia mostly which desiredthe neutrality of the new monarchy The Prussians wanted a fresh barrier to the possible military designs of France. The Roman steps! What a curious sound the words have as the description of anything existing in a remote pass among some of the wildest and loneliest scenery in North Wales. Yet one is assured that if one goes on up the pass beyond Cym Bychan Lake one will come to "the Roman steps." Certainly if one follows the directions one does come to stone steps of a kind, and, as to the name, local traditions of this sort have a curious way of turning not, in the long run, to have a substratum of fact. Up the pass, in fact, go a series of stone slabs which might indeed, without much stretch of imagination, be dignified by the name of steps, affording firm footbold for either man or pack horse, for the gradient is such that a horse or

SIDELIGHT ON "PLANNED RETREAT."

Peculiar light on the reiterated eGrman assertions that the retreat of the Teuton forces on the Western front was pre-arranged and carried out according to plan without undue haste, is cast by A. S. Meyer, war correspondent of the Essen Allgemeine Zeitung, who gives an account of his visit to a high Staff officer of General von Hutier's army, to whom he has referred the information. The officer, who had not slept three hours at a stretch for days, showed traces of excessive fatigue.

"In the midst of the officer's explanatory statement," says Meyer, artlessly, "the telephone rang, and news came that the enemy had rushed in on the left flank of the army of von der Marwitz, and that his right flank was endangered. TREATMENT OF WAR PRISONERS Starved and Ill - Treated

RED CROSS FLAG ABUSED.

LONDON, October 15. Sir G. Younger's committee report based on the testimony of upwards of seventy escapees regarding German treatment of war prisoners taken during the spring offensive, says: It is almost an exact counterpart of the treatment of earlier prisoners. The enemy totally failed in some cases for forty-eight hours to provide the prisoners with any food. This may be explained by the number of prisoners exceeding expectations, but the substance thereafter was inadequate. Prisoners were also forced to do unauthorised work near the battle front Many compounds were without warmth, shelter or sanitation. Some guards were cruel, and a few doctors were brutal. The prisoners at Villers were forced to live in the open for a fortmight. They could not dry their

clothes and could not wash. The report adds-The Red Cross was flown over ammunition dumps. -A. and N.Z. and Reuter.
