INFLUX OF ASIATICS

MR MASSEY'S STATEMENT.

(Press Association.)

AUCKLAND, Saturday.

The influx of Asiatics into the

Dominion and the uneasiness occasioned

thereby have not escaped the attention

of the Government.

Mr Massey stated yesterday that

the difficulty in dealing with the

matter was due to the fact that the

Indians, to whose arrival exception

was being taken, were British sub-

jects.

The matter has been referred to

the Crown Law Office in order that

it may be ascertained whether there

is sufficient power at present vested

in the Government to check the

immigration. If the Powers now exist-

ing prove insufficient Parliament will

be asked to deal with the matter as

early as possible in the session, which

commences in June.

FLU IN AUCKLAND

AUCKLAND, Saturday.

Thirty-seven cases of influenza, only

one being severe, were reported in

the Auckland Health District during

74 hours ended at noon yesterday.

There is a pretty widespread epide-

mic of influenza in the North and

we have accordingly decided to close

the schools in Whangarei, Bay of

Islands and Hokianga districts for

the next week.

Dr. Mackill, District Health Officer,

stated: "I can say nothing about

the numbers, but all the doctors in

the districts named are notifying

cases freely. There are one or two

serious cases, but no more than

arise in the ordinary course of mild

influenza." Referring to influenza

among the Maoris at Rotorua camp,

Dr. Mackill stated that his cases

were all very mild and so much like

simple colds that they scarcely warranted

being diagnosed as influenza.
