AUGELAND, June 1. In connection with the dispute between the Thames Hauraki Company and Drainage Board re the drainage of the Thames deep levels, it is understood that the contributing companies who own the Big Pump are agreeable to the adoption of the Hon. Mr Cadman's suggestion to refer the matter to arbitration as to what amount is to be paid to the Thames Hauraki Company, providing that the companies are not called upon to pay increased rates. It is hardly likely, however, that the Minister will depart yesterday's interview, when he declined to go into details as to who was to pay or where the money was to come from. It is held by the Drainage Board, or at least some of the members of the deputation, that the mines specially deriving the benefit should pay the increase of rates equivalent to the amount to be paid to the Thames Hauraki Company. It is thought herthat an amicable settlement is probable as the result of the stand taken by the Minister and his suggestion to allow the Mining Inspector to assess the amount which the Thames Hauraki is entitled to.
