This halfpenny is absorbed by the duty imposed, and the effect has been to greatly increase the price of fish in Australia. One importer in Victoria, who had a large quantity of New Zealand cured fish in store, is now realising 8s 6d per dozen instead of 3s 6d as formerly.
