

In a recent issue of the American Machinist Mr F. Explosives. Richards discusses the question of explosives in compressed-air plants due to the existence of oil in the compressor or pipe-line and its vapourisation by eated air, the air and the vapour forming an explosive mixture. The barque Fairport has arrived at Port Adelaide in a disabled state. She left New York for Yokohama on July 8. On October 10, when in lat, 44:57 S. and long. 57:50 E. she was running before a heavy gale, when a huge sea boke over her, and a sai'or named H. Lawenson was washed overboard and not seen again. The next morning another man was washed away from the wheel, but was secured before he went over the rail. The weather continued so bad that oil was pured on the water. Then the vessel was thrown on her beam ends, and remained there like a waterlogged craft. The lower yardarms were in the water, and part of the cargo was jettisoned. Still the vessel failed to right herself, and the lee yardarms were under water. The captain then decided to throw water. The cargo, and 9000 cases of kerosene were got rid of. These, no doubt, are whet the steamer Port Donison reported last week as having met. Before the Fairport finally righted the foretopmust had to be cut away above the cap, and the maintopmast had also to go. In the meantime the vessel had drifted nearly to Cape Lenwin, when the master decided to run for Port Adelaide, where the damage will be repaired before the trip to Yokohama is continued.
