LETTER-SORTERS' TRIALS

WHERE THE PUBLIC FAILS.

Every adult in the Dominion uses the Post Office, but the great majority have the haziest ideas regarding the methods by which millions of articles annually are sorted, transmitted, and delivered. It is probable most people think the business of sorting letters is very easy. The average man most likely imagines "any fool can sort letters." This is a mistake.

A satisfactory sorter must have good memory, and requires months

Only experienced, men can be entrusted with primary corting, because before they can undertake that duty they must have memorised the post offices throughout the Dominion as well as those persons who receive their correspondence through private

The private box sorting imposes a severe tax on the memory. The sorters are expected to memorise thousands of names and to remember in which boxes correspondence for each has to be placed. The task is, of course, impossible.

Letters for private box holders are in the process of primary, sorting missorted to carriers and suffer delay. Others are placed in the wrong boxes, and this gives rise to numerous complaints.
